This completes the multi-million pound investment programme in all our activities at Blackhills, ensuring that it continues to be well placed to service the Aberdeen construction market for many years to come.

I must take this opportunity to personally thank Louie Gray for his outstanding service and commitment to the Leiths business over the last 40 years. Louie was our longest standing Manager/Director and has been invaluable to me as the Company has grown since I started out in the early 1970's.

I wish you all a Very Merry Christmas.

## SALT DISTRIBUTION

It's that time of year again when Councils start to stock up with salt for their winter gritting operations in advance of the freezing weather setting in.

Salt is taken into Aberdeen and Buckie Harbour from Teesport and Ireland on ships carrying anything from 2,500t to 8,000t at a time. Our distribution team here in Cove work with Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire, and Moray Councils to distribute the salt from the harbours to the various depots located throughout the North East of Scotland.

Time is costly for a ship docked in a harbour so off-loading as quickly as possible is a key priority. Our distribution team have to organise a sufficient number of lorries to ensure there is a constant flow of salt going from the harbour to the Council depots. It is from these depots the Councils load their gritters with salt ready to treat our roads during the winter months.

During harsh winters it is common for us to be distributing up to 100,000t of salt to ensure the road network is kept gritted and safe for driving. That is the equivalent amount of salt contained in 227 billion packets of crisps!







## CONCRETE SUPPLY TO NEW SALMON FARM

LEITHS HAVE COMMENCED CONCRETE SUPPLY FROM THEIR RECENTLY COMMISSIONED MOBILE CONCRETE PLANT AT KISHORN QUARRY TO NOFITECH, FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW RECIRCULATING AQUACULTURE SYSTEM.

The Scottish Salmon Company awarded Nofitech the contract to design and build the system which is an indoor land-based aquaculture system that allows fish to be reared for longer in freshwater tanks before being moved to marine sites.

The project involves the construction of two large concrete buildings each with two Recirculating Aquaculture Systems. When complete the buildings will be 16m and 20m in diameter, with each accommodating four tanks. The buildings are to be constructed of reinforced concrete with the tank walls serving as the external walls and are supported by the foundation slab. The total concrete requirement for this project is 4,500m<sup>3</sup>.

Following successful laboratory and production trials, with the aggregates and crushed rock fines produced at Kishorn Quarry, concrete supply for the foundation slab commenced on the 5th of October with 1,600m<sup>3</sup> supplied over 11 pours during a four-week period. Concrete designed with 50% cement replacement using Ground Granulated Blast Furnace Slag was necessary to comply with the XS1 exposure class specified for reinforced concrete in coastal areas, providing a lower Co2 embodied concrete. Concrete supply for the walls commenced the 2nd week in November and will continue over the coming months with each wall pour taking 80m<sup>3</sup>.

Having our mobile Concrete Plant on site with our locally available aggregates and replacing CEM I with Ground Granulated Blast Furnace Slag, Leiths were able to supply a concrete with significantly lower levels of embodied Co2 with savings of over 840t of Co2 providing a more sustainable and durable concrete.





## **Major Investment at Blackhills Quarry**

Situated near Cove, Aberdeen, Blackhills Quarry has been operational within the Leiths Group since the late 70's. During this period, we have extracted over 15 million tonnes of high-quality Granite. The quarry produces a wide range of construction aggregates as well as rock armour, ready mixed concrete, and asphalt materials.

Both the location of the quarry, which is only 200m from the North Sea, and the attrition of the particularly hard granite, means that wear and corrosion play a significant part in plant longevity of this busy quarry. As a key producer within the Leiths Group, the time was right to renew our fixed crushing and screening plant to support our onsite concrete and asphalt plants.

The upgrade work started with installing a new reclaim tunnel system which feeds primary crushed rock to a new 50t surge hopper that in turn feeds a large secondary crusher.

The secondary crushed material is then fed over a Sandvik SC2472 Circular Motion Screen which splits the rock into three size fractions plus a Type 1 Sub Base. From the large holding hoppers below, the rock is fed into three Tertiary cone crushers with a fourth Quaternary cone crusher to balance production requirements of specific aggregate sizes when needed. These reliable and efficient crushers produce aggregates ranging in sizes from 32mm down to dust. From these crushers the material is conveyed up to our final screening station where the aggregates are passed over three large Sandvik (1x SC2462 and 2x SC2472) screens which sort the aggregates into their respective size fractions storing in large hoppers below.

From these holding hoppers the aggregates can be either fed directly into the asphalt plant or loaded into dumpers or road going tippers for stocking for onward delivery to customers.

As part of our continuing commitment to energy efficiency, every effort was made to design in the most energy resourceful technology throughout the new processing plant.

Variable speed drives were used wherever energy savings could be made. Control logic maintains the plant at an optimum throughput to minimise stop-start running and the need to run empty plant and machinery. Feeding the freshly crushed aggregates and dust directly into the asphalt plant from the storage hoppers optimises fuel consumption and production throughout, as well as emitting less carbon into the atmosphere.

This significant project demonstrates our ongoing commitment to investment and ensures we continue to exceed the elevated levels of quality and service that our customers have come to expect.





# Kishorn Port welcomes the Grand Canyon III

### IN AUGUST THE PORT WELCOMED THE GRAND CANYON III, AN OFFSHORE SUPPORT VESSEL, FOR LAYOVER AND RE-SUPPLY.

The 128m long, 12,500 tonne vessel had been undertaking cable trenching work for a new 11 mile long undersea electricity connection between Skye and Harris. The original connection had been damaged in October 2020 leaving Harris and Lewis cut off from the national electricity grid.

The port assisted with the loading of stores and a change of crew.

The vessel is pictured at the dry dock quay close to the Voyageur Sprit FPSO moored in the dry dock.



### Mar Lodge Estate Victoria Bridge

THE TEAM AT LOCHTON PRECAST HAVE RECENTLY COMPLETED PRODUCTION OF CONCRETE PLINTH BLOCKS DESIGNED TO PROTECT THE NORTH PIER ON THE VICTORIA BRIDGE AFTER SUFFERING STRUCTURAL DAMAGE DURING STORM FRANK IN 2015.

Victoria Bridge is the early 20th century lattice girder bridge over the River Dee at Mar Lodge on the Mar Lodge Estate, Aberdeenshire. This bridge, built in 1905, replaced an earlier wooden bridge built in 1848 by the Duke of Leeds during his tenancy of the estate. The archway at the south end of the bridge bears '1848 Queen Victoria 1848' on the south side and '1905 Edward VII 1905' commemorating the construction of both bridges and the reigning monarch at the time.

The bridge is due to be totally dismantled piece by piece and taken off site so that new cast iron sections can be installed to replace those damaged by the storm. The entire structure will also receive a new coat of paint and restored to its former glory allowing members of the public to make full use of the crossing once again.

This is a challenging project with each plinth block having its own individual shape, so timber moulds were manufactured to suit each section, and steel reinforcement cages were bent and tied to fit the moulds. Bending the plywood for the moulds and the steel proved to be difficult and took some time with the more intricate shapes. Due to the current climate with the shortage of timber and increasing costs, sourcing materials suitable to complete the job was also a big challenge. The way each unit pieced together the tolerances were tight so there was really no room for error with the dimensions and angles.

To ensure the units had been made correctly, the team did a trial layout in the yard at Lochton before delivery. The client specified a darker concrete than our normal grey so, following a number of production trials, pigment was used to keep the colour to the client's requirements.

Working with Taziker and to tight delivery dates, the Lochton team completed their part in the project and the units were successfully delivered and installed on the north pier before the deadline date.

With all other work now underway, the bridge will be closed to pedestrians, cyclists, horses and vehicles until December 2021. The nearest alternative crossing to access Mar Lodge Estate is at the Linn of Dee bridge, three miles west of Victoria Bridge.



## **Civil Engineering & Surfacing Update**

It's been an extremely busy period for the Leiths C&S Division since the last edition of Leiths News in the Spring.

The division has completed over 150 contracts throughout the country with works ranging from LIDL and CO-OP stores throughout the central belt for Dickie & Moore; new health facilities in Skye for David Smith; substantial overlays for Highland Council in the Badenoch and Strathspey region; surfacing for Distillery owners Chivas and WM Grant throughout Moray, and housing sites in Aberdeenshire for JKR.

### Aberdeen City Council – Carriageway Resurfacing

Leiths Aberdeen based squads, led by Foremen Andy Kennedy and Chas Mackenzie, have continued to resurface many sites for Aberdeen City Council as part of their framework contract with over 12000t of material over 20 sites laid through the Summer and early Autumn months.

The most notable of the projects was at the beach esplanade where works were required to be completed ahead of schedule due to the imminent arrival of some 100 cyclists!

### New ALDI Store Portlethen Retail Park

Leiths Civil Engineering Division recently completed the groundworks to the new ALDI store in Portlethen. Undertaking the works for Burns Construction, the existing front car park was milled and resurfaced with 500 tonnes of hot rolled asphalt, new slabbing, kerbing drainage, and bollards. Internally, new foundations, drainage and utilities were installed to suit the new shop layout. The back the existing yard was excavated, prepared, and a new concrete yard was constructed.

Under a separate order, ALDI instructed Leiths to construct a new ramp into the building for deliveries.

Completion of the works were time critical to coincide with ALDI opening dates for the store and this was achieved, largely helped by Leiths ability to supply concrete despite recent shortages with cement deliveries. The works came in ahead of time and to the high standard expected by the client.





### **Billy Miller Findrassie**

Leiths Surfacing Moray squads have recently started two new housing sites for Billy Miller. The sites at Findrassie, Elgin for Barratt homes, and Knockomie Braes in Forres for Springfield Properties, involve some 5000t of base course, 3500t of binder course and 6000t of surface courses, the majority of which is hot rolled asphalt.

Both sites have had good starts and the ariel photo above shows some of the base and binder laid at the Findrassie site.

**New member of the Team:** We are also pleased to announce the return of Sean Cocker as our Asphalt Manager for Surfacing, home from his 10-year spell working in the Middle East. ### LAWRIE DEMOLITION HAVE BEEN WORKING HARD OVER THE SUMMER MONTHS COMPLETING A NUMBER OF LOCAL PROJECTS

### TRAFALGAR HOUSE DEMOLITION ON BEHALF OF FARO CAPITAL

When London based property group Faro Capital Ltd decided that their Trafalgar House property on Hareness Road, Aberdeen was no longer feasible to maintain or divide into smaller sections, they contacted Lawrie Demolition for advice.

Following discussions over a number of months Faro appointed Lawrie to remove the asbestos and then demolish the offices. Lawrie assisted Faro with gaining the demolition warrant and the termination of all services prior to works commencing.

Once the asbestos was removed from the stairwells of the original concrete building, Lawrie began the process of stripping out the interiors back to the concrete shell in preparation for mechanical demolition. Excavators fitted with hydraulic pulverisers began the dismantle of the concrete frame, reducing the height and processing the concrete to remove the reinforcing, prior to processing the concrete for recycle.

The soft stripping works began in the second 4 storey steel framed building, removing all fixtures and fittings, to leave only the steel frame ready for mechanical demolition. A specialist 30m high reach machine, fitted with hydraulic shear attachment, reduced the metal frame with the materials being processed on site prior to removal for recycle. The concrete floors, lift shafts, foundations were all broken out and processed for recycle.

The project took 7 months to complete with a recycle percentage of materials calculated at 96%.



## UNION TERRACE GARDENS WORKS FOR BALFOUR BEATTY

Lawrie Demolition were approached by Balfour Beatty to advise on the removal of the concrete slab above the iconic arches at Union Terrace Gardens in Aberdeen after the original slab had been deemed unfit for purpose for the new development.

Following discussions with site structural engineers, a plan was set out that would allow approximately 20lm of slab to be lifted out in each visit, which would allow Balfour to repour the new slab prior to each phase of removal.

A series of temporary works were installed at each arch, which allowed Lawrie to cut the 250mm slab into sections approximately 6m2. Each section was cored to allow slinging for lifting. As the space available to work was extremely tight, the use of a crane would not be viable. With this in mind Lawrie used a specialist zero swing tail excavator to lift the sections of slab onto our roll-on-roll-off skip lorry and the materials were removed to our Joss Quarry at Lochills for recycling.

Once each phase was completed, Balfour Beatty would pour new concrete and form the new walkway above the arches. In total, approximately 192lm were removed in the original scope. As a result, and with the success of this phase, Lawrie were awarded additional floor removal works.

### THE CUMBERNAULD BASED DIVISION HAVE COMMENCED SIGNAGE INSTALLATION WORK IN PARTNERSHIP WITH BUTTERFIELD SIGNS.

The main works involve foundations, concrete, post and sign installations. The contract is a roll out to all Morrisons' stores across the UK. Markon Signs will install the "Click & Collect" signage across Scotland and the North of England, with the contract due to complete by the end of the year.

# Natural Stone Awards 2020

The Awards celebrate and recognise the excellence of design in natural stone projects from across the industry. They provide a chance for the industry to showcase the wide range of applications possible with natural stone and to demonstrate that it is the ideal building material, providing architects, designers and clients with a sustainable, durable and attractive end product.

The Awards are split into nine categories:

- New Build Modern Style Stone Cladding Any project that features non load-bearing natural stone cladding as covered by BS 8298.
- New Build Traditional Style Stonemasonry Any project that features load-bearing natural stone.
- Repair & Restoration

Any project that involves the repair and restoration of natural stone on part of a building or the building as a whole.

• Interiors

Any project that uses natural stone within an interior setting, including domestic, commercial and high-end residential.

### • Landscaping

Any project that involves the use of natural stone in landscaping, whether it be public realm, commercial or private projects.

### • Craftsmanship

Any project that displays a high standard of stonemasonry craftsmanship.

### • Carving, Lettering & Sculpture

This can be a new commission, replacement or part replacement of the original which has become disfigured or lost.

• Technology Innovation

Any project that displays the use of technology (computers and other machinery) in the creation or carving of natural stone projects of all description.

### Sustainability

Any project that displays positive elements of sustainability, for example, re-use of materials, use of local materials or environmentally conscious project management.

## ABERDEEN HARBOUR EXPANSION PROJECT PROGRESSES



### WE ARE PLEASED TO REPORT THAT OUR JOINT VENTURE WITH BREEDON, TO SUPPLY CONCRETE TO THE ABERDEEN HARBOUR EXPANSION PROJECT, IS GOING WELL AS WE PROGRESS TOWARDS THE END OF SOME MAJOR MILESTONES.

With some 70,000m<sup>3</sup> of concrete supplied up to the end of October 2021, we are now nearing the end of two main focal areas of supply.

The Crown wall, which sits on the North Breakwater, acts as a protective barrier from the aggressive North Sea overtopping into the harbour. The wall consists of 62 individual sections stretching the length of the 600m breakwater. Each section poured required 440m<sup>3</sup> (1,100t) of concrete which needed to be continuously supplied. As the wall construction progressed it is topped with a massive cope, each containing a further 220m<sup>3</sup> (550t) of concrete taking the full wall height to 12m. It's not until you are standing beside it that you fully appreciate the size and scale of this structure.

The other significant supply was to the onsite Accropode factory which is sited at the South compound. The Accropodes are unreinforced concrete objects designed to resist the action of waves on breakwaters and coastal structures. The units being manufactured for the project were 8m<sup>3</sup>, 12m<sup>3</sup> and 16m<sup>3</sup> in size, or for those who understand weight better 20t, 30t and 40t respectively.

The concrete is pumped from our delivery vehicles into the massive Accropode moulds which sit on a carousel unit. As each mould is filled it moves around the carousel and is stripped after just 24 hours of being poured.

Achieving the daily supply target of 360m<sup>3</sup> permitted Van Oord to manufacture 31 Accropodes each day. The supply has now been concluded with a total of 2,262 units made. These are now being used to complete the construction of the South Breakwater.

What can't be understated is the technical and operational work that goes on behind the scenes to design, manufacture and deliver such high performing concrete mixes suitable for these applications. Its credit to both teams from Leiths and Breedon for their knowledge and expertise which has been instrumental in the project's success to date.

The QR codes do not replace SharePoint, which is still our primary method of recording and monitoring Incidents and Near Misses, but it does give you another easy to use and efficient way to feedback your observations to the HSEQ team – simply use the camera on your smartphone to follow the link and fill out the form.

### MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID

Just as CPR helps to provide life saving assistance to someone having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid helps to assist someone experiencing a mental health issue and could be just as effective in saving a life.

We recognise the importance of maintaining a healthy mind and the challenges presented during the COVID pandemic. With depression, anxiety and stress common in society, we have begun a programme of training personnel as Mental Health First Aiders in an attempt to provide support.

These Mental Health First Aiders are trained in assessing the likelihood of individuals being at risk and they will listen nonjudgmentally whilst providing reassurance and information. The Mental Health First Aiders will be best placed to encourage individuals to seek help confidentially.

We will be alerting you of who these Mental Health First Aiders are in the workplace and how you can contact them in due course.



### QUARRY SAFETY PASSPORT COURSE

This year has seen a number of developments in relation to how we deliver in-house training courses, with remote learning used at the beginning of the year through to limited attendance at training courses delivered face to face.



Maintaining the competence levels of our personnel throughout the Group has always been important to the Board and, with the onset of COVID, the delivery of training courses had to be reviewed and adapted.

During the lockdown at the beginning of 2021, remote learning was used effectively allowing larger groups to attend training sessions whilst remaining safe, but this was always going to be a short-term solution.

We are fortunate that in-house training courses can be delivered at three locations: Mid Lairgs Quarry in Inverness, Markon in Cumbernauld, and at the new Training facility at LochHills Quarry, Aberdeen.

The Mineral Product Qualification Council Quarry Safety Passport Course is one of the Industry recognised courses that is delivered in-house, and continues to be successful in informing the attendees of the requirements of working within quarries and extractives industry.

Contracting personnel have received Construction related courses on the requirements placed on them as part of the Construction Design and Management Regulations and the systems that we have implemented within the Group which align with these regulations.

Although the delivery requirements have been challenging, we are making real headway into this ongoing objective.

## Slips, Trips and Falls

During 2021, we have had a number of slip, trip and fall injury incidents involving Leiths group personnel. We need to collectively raise awareness and change behavioural attitudes towards slip, trip and fall hazards.

Slips, trips and falls account for around 40% of major injuries and can also lead to other types of serious accidents, for example falls from height. Slips, trips and falls are also the most reported injury to members of the public.

The factors influencing slips, trips and falls fit broadly into two categories: environmental and human. It is often assumed that

slips, trips and falls are simply errors of execution, for example putting one's foot down wrongly, rather than active failures, which suggest an element of bad planning or decision-making.

To reduce slip, trip and fall accidents we need to:

- Assess the ground conditions
- Ensure housekeeping of or workplace is of the highest standard
- Improve workplace layouts
- Wear the correct footwear
- Encourage near miss reporting

You have a major role in keeping yourself safe – if in doubt STOP!

## **Aboyne and Mid-Deeside Community Shed**

## FYFE GLENROCK RECENTLY PROVIDED A BOULDER TO SIT AT THE ENTRANCE OF THE ROAD LEADING TO THE ABOYNE AND MID-DEESIDE COMMUNITY SHED.

The Blackhills Granite boulder was cut in half and the smooth face sandblasted and painted silver, with the granite also being sealed to enhance the natural colour of the stone.

The Community Shed is an inclusive community space where groups can hold their regular workshops, arts, crafts and other practical sessions. The Shed has been open since the 1970s to combat rural isolation and is a non-profit making facility run by members of the local community.

The Trustees were very pleased with the entrance stone, with Douglas Riach, Secretary of the Community Shed commenting, "Many people have already remarked on how perfect and attractive it is for the location, are we are very grateful indeed for the care and attention, skill and time which has been given to his key and unique feature of our project."

## Mark Robinson MC500 Motorcycle Fundraiser for NERVS

### MARK ROBINSON, ONE OF LEITHS PLANT OPERATORS, CONTINUES HIS QUEST TO RAISE VITAL FUNDS FOR HIS CHOSEN CHARITIES, ALL OF WHICH ARE CLOSE TO HIS HEART.

In May, Mark motorcycled the North Coast 500, Scotland's equivalent of Route 66, in just one day to raise funds for North East Rider Volunteers Scotland (NERVS), a charity where he volunteers, which provides free transportation for the Grampian Health Service.

The journey started at Inverness Castle where Mark was joined by his friend Brett Bonas throughout the journey, where they completed the 516 miles in 12 hours and 45 minutes, raising £1,022.40.

Mark said: "Over the years, I've done Lands End to John O'Groats by motorcycle in one day, as well as Lands End to John O'Groats and back to Lands End in just two days. In 2012, while serving in Grampian Police, I rode a marked police bike to all 51 of the police force HQ's at the time on the mainland in 10 days and 3,500 miles for Commando 999. The following year, I went to the four furthest most compass points and police memorials for Care of Police Survivors on my motorcycle. And later that year I did a six-hour gym endurance event, lifting 107.84 tonnes to raise funds for Commando 999 again. After Storm Frank (in 2015), I arranged a huge fundraiser for the victims in Ballater and raised just over £16,000 in one evening. You can see I'm keen to do my bit."

Leiths were happy to support Mark on this journey covering the cost of his fuel and accommodation.

Mark commented, "it's gestures like these that help the planning of events like this happen."

surfacing. We would consider him to be one of the best all-rounders within the Industry.

We would like to thank Davie for his contribution to Markon's success over the years – a conscientious worker ever ready to dispense his knowledge and skills to help in the completion of the job. His colleagues look forward in working with Davie for many more years to come.

## Leiths Upgrade to Weightsoft 5

Leiths upgraded their weighbridge software from Weighsoft 4 to Weighsoft 5 during 2020. Weightsoft seamlessly handles the process of weighing material in and out of the quarries. The software captures weight data, prints tickets and produces reports for creating customer invoices. Weighsoft 5 allows us to phase out the use of paper tickets and move to the more modern method of electronic ticketing. When our drivers proceed to the weighbridge after being loaded with material they would have normally been issued with a printed ticket. Now when they pass onto the weighbridge the ticket is electronically generated and sent to their tablets. On arrival at site, the customer signs for the delivery on the tablet and that ticket is then automatically emailed directly to them. Following the successful delivery of that load, our drivers can see their next work instruction on the tablet.

The use of electronic ticketing has many benefits:

- It reduces unnecessary use of paper.
- Reduces the impact on the environment.
- Sends tickets instantly to customers, giving them live updates on when materials are delivered.
- Paper tickets are no longer misplaced or lost.
- The app can store locally up to 7 days' worth of data, ensuring our drivers can continue using the app as normal without concern due to a lack of signal.
- If no one is on site to sign to accept the delivery, which has become more common due to COVID-19, the app can accommodate this when completing the ticket and the customer will receive a delivery ticket acknowledging this.

As well as dealing with electronic ticketing, Weighsoft 5 has an additional function which allows our drivers to carryout their First Use checks on the tablet rather than on a paper check sheet. It is mandatory for every driver to inspect their vehicle before it is used that day. These checks are set out and normally completed on a defect book. Weighsoft 5 allows the drivers to complete the same checks on their tablets and, once complete, the details of that inspection are emailed directly to our Fleet Department. This allows our fleet team to support our drivers more effectively by responding to defects quicker.

Following a successful trial, we will continue the roll out the tablets to all drivers within the Group. The aim will be to make all quarry sales paperless in the future. The tablets will hopefully also benefit the drivers by providing sat nav, avoid the need to carry paper tickets and reduce the need to contact transport to establish their next delivery.

Although this is a big change of process for the drivers, the app's simple workflow has seen our drivers respond positively, which is encouraging ahead of the much bigger roll out across the Group in 2022.
